# Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends. John 15: 13

We come together today to remember those who have lost their lives during times of conflict and in acts of terror, to pray for peace and to dedicate ourselves to the creation of a more humane and just society.

On the 4th of August 1914 Britain entered one of the costliest conflicts in history – the First World War – with fighting continuing until the 11th of November 1918, Armistice Day.

At the eleventh hour on the eleventh day of the eleventh month, the two Minute Silence is observed on Armistice Day. Today, on Remembrance Sunday, we remember those who died fighting for freedom during two world wars, as well as those who have died in subsequent conflicts and those who are on the battlefield today. We also remember civilians who suffer the consequences of war and terror.

We come here to honour those who have paid the ultimate sacrifice, but not to glorify their loss. We come also to reflect on the true horror of war, so that we might not forget. We come in the name of God, who might seem absent during times of despair, but who is always there in the midst of the carnage and chaos. In the words of Wilfred Owen- First world war Soldier and Poet - "Christ is literally in no-man's-land, there men often hear his voice..."
